CFSO Strategic Plan 2026

GOALS

Legislative Budget FY27 Funding

FEDERAL BUDGET STATUS

- Big Beautiful Bill: first tranche released of \$3.5b with forensic carve-out
- FY26 budget
 - Commerce, Justice, Science signed into law 1/23/2026
 - HHS (CDC) signed into law 2/2026
- FY27 budget:
 - House - CJS Appropriations (DOJ/NIST)
 - House – HHS Appropriations (CDC, OD2A grants)
 - Senate– stuck

“BIG BEAUTIFUL BILL”

Bridging Immigration-related Deficits Experienced Nationwide (BIDEN) Reimbursement Fund

([Pub. L. 119–21, title X, §100055, July 4, 2025, 139 Stat. 392](#))

\$3.5b in grants to eligible States, State agencies, and units of local government (will be in tranches)

Collection and analysis of law enforcement investigative information within the United States to counter gang or other criminal activity.

Investigating and prosecuting-

- (A) Crimes committed by aliens within the United States
- (B) Drug and human trafficking crimes committed within the United States.

CFSO worked with DAG, OJP and Congress to ensure inclusion of forensics in the funding

CFSO working to expand the H.R.8564, Local Law Enforcement Support Act of 2026” to ensure forensic priorities are highlighted and not just the few technologies mentioned: digital forensics, NIBIN, Rapid DNA as defined in law

Interoperability of Automated Biometric Identification Systems- The Committee is concerned about the lack of interoperability among various automated biometric identification systems, and notes that unlike DNA there is no single mechanism to search for latent prints across jurisdictions. The Committee understands that NIST and the National Institute of Justice (NIJ) have spent a significant amount of time working to address this issue, including the production of the standards and guidance necessary to support the development of interoperable systems, but the problem remains. Not later than 60 days after the enactment of this Act, **the Committee directs NIJ, in coordination with NIST, to provide an update on work done to date to resolve this matter, the barriers that remain, and a path forward.**

Language FY27 Budget-Ballistics

House-FBI

Ballistics Research and Operational Support Facilities-The Committee recognizes investing in sites with existing specialized scientific infrastructure and research capabilities, including those in North Alabama, will strengthen ballistic analysis, enhance investigative support, and ensure the FBI maintains state-of-the art operational capacity. Therefore, **the Committee directs the FBI to prioritize modernization and expansion of facilities that support forensic and ballistic research critical to national law enforcement operations.**

Language FY27 Budget-Ballistics

House-ATF

National Integrated Ballistic Information Network (NIBIN).—The Committee recognizes NIBIN as a critical tool in the national effort to reduce violence and combat violent crime. State and local law enforcement agencies consistently report that NIBIN plays a vital role in their investigations, enabling the timely matching of ballistic evidence from crime scenes nationwide and supporting the development of actionable leads to solve and prevent violent offenses. The Committee further recognizes that the continued effectiveness of the program depends on sustained investment in the personnel, technical infrastructure, and Federal-to-local coordination required to operate the network nationwide. To ensure the continued effectiveness and expansion of this vital program, the

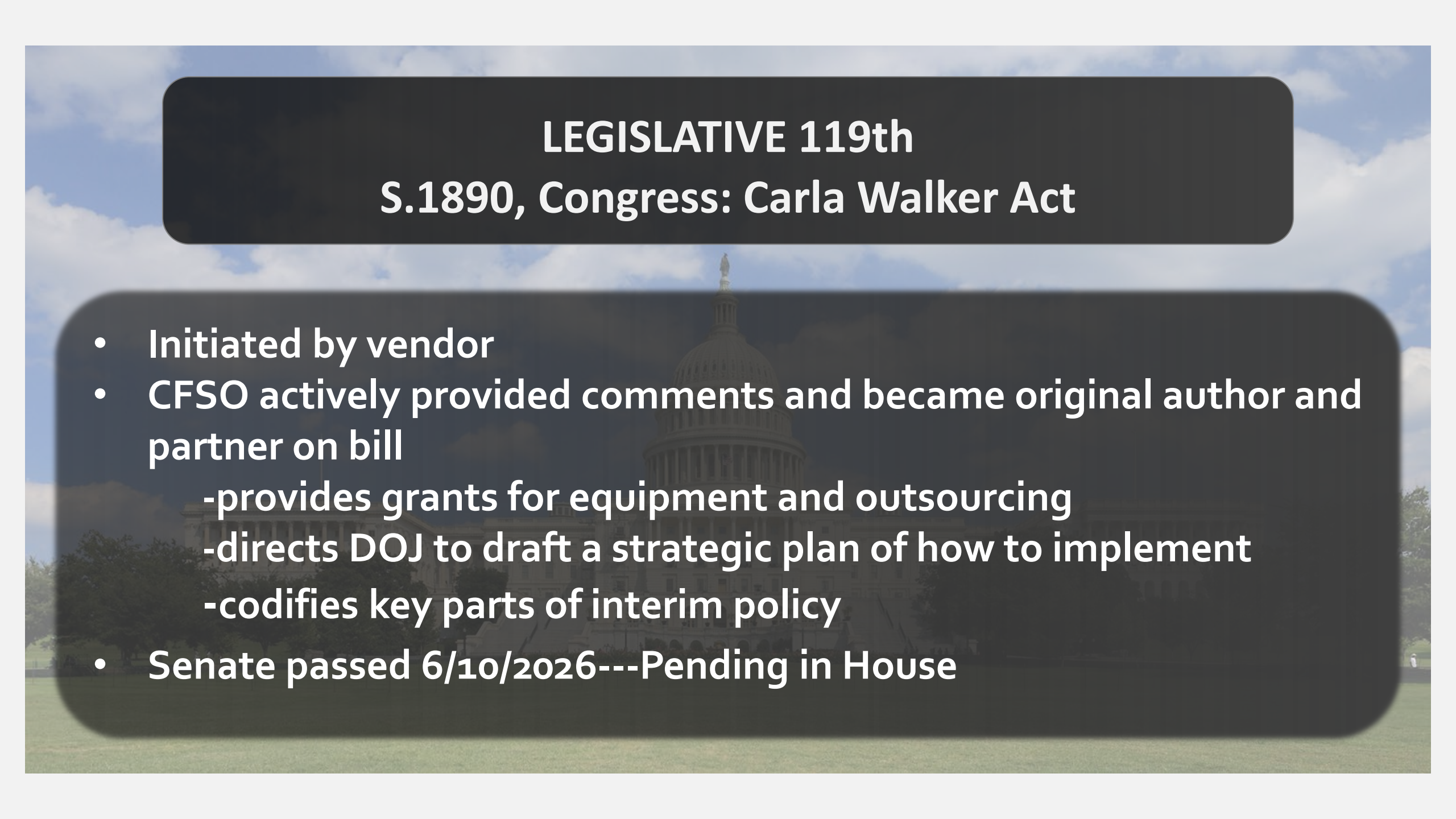
Committee directs ATF to allocate not less than \$82,000,000 but up to \$100,000,000 for NIBIN.

The Committee urges ATF to continue expanding NIBIN deployment to additional jurisdictions, ensure sufficient staffing for timely evidence processing, upgrades to machinery, and investment in greater correlation capacity. The Committee also supports improved integration of NIBIN with crime gun intelligence efforts, the development of advanced data analytics to identify crime trends, and expanded opportunities for international ballistic data sharing, including with Mexico and INTERPOL.

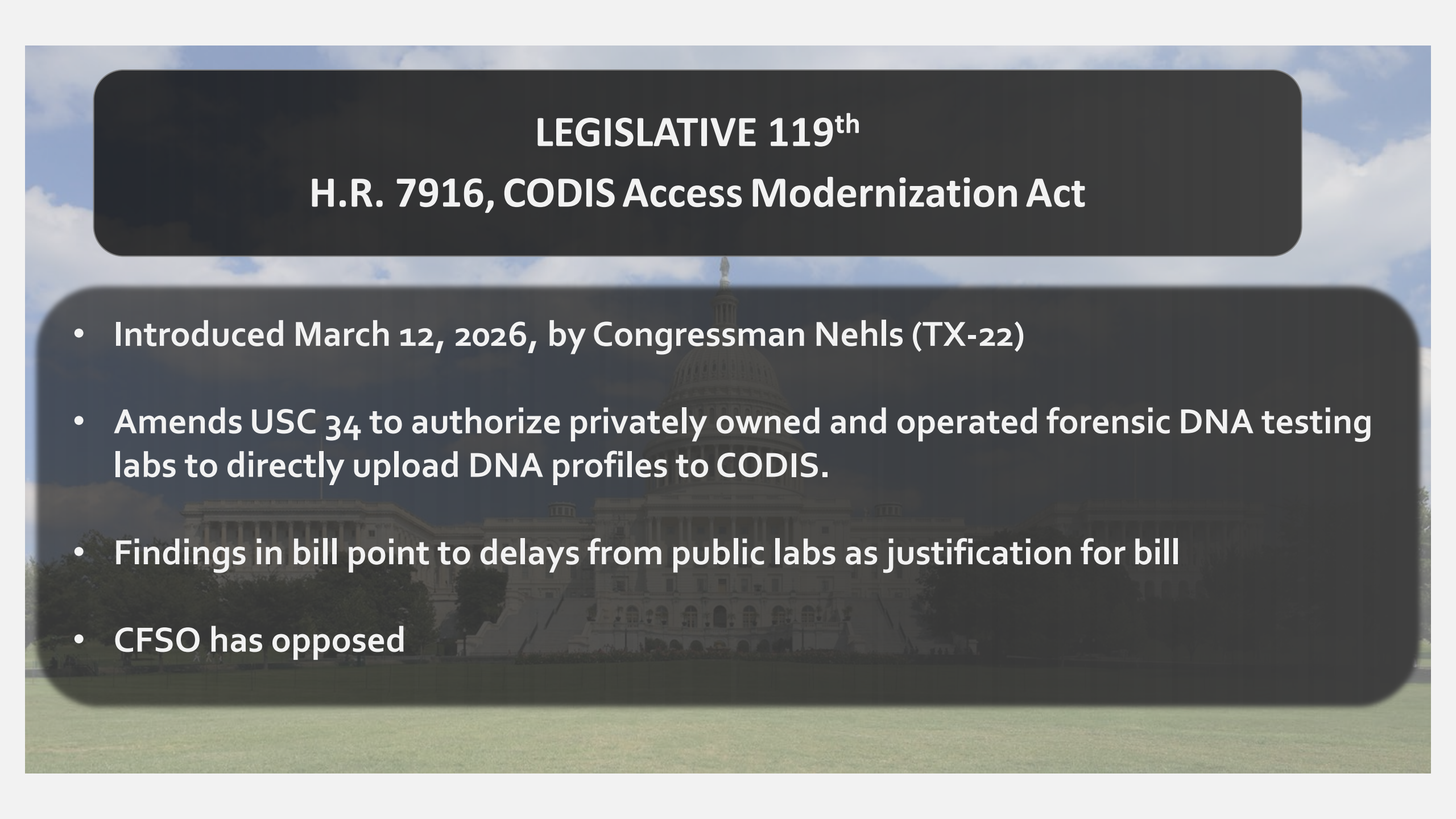
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LEGISLATIVE 119th

S.1890, Congress: Carla Walker Act

- Initiated by vendor
- CFSO actively provided comments and became original author and partner on bill
 - provides grants for equipment and outsourcing
 - directs DOJ to draft a strategic plan of how to implement
 - codifies key parts of interim policy
- Senate passed 6/10/2026---Pending in House



LEGISLATIVE 119th

H.R. 7916, CODIS Access Modernization Act

- Introduced March 12, 2026, by Congressman Nehls (TX-22)
- Amends USC 34 to authorize privately owned and operated forensic DNA testing labs to directly upload DNA profiles to CODIS.
- Findings in bill point to delays from public labs as justification for bill
- CFSO has opposed

Forensic Science Week Designation

- Senate Resolution 395 (2026)
- National Forensic Science Week 2025 was recognized from September 14–20, 2025, to honor the professionals, labs, and technologies that support the criminal justice system.

COVERDELL ADVOCACY

West Virginia University data from Project Foresight lists growth in national forensic backlogs from 2017-2023 of up to 13%. Turnaround times in the United States forensic service providers from 2017- 2023 have increased by up to **40%**, including 10% in DNA casework, 19% in drug chemistry, 18% in toxicology, and 18% in firearms analysis. Specifically, the backlog in blood alcohol over the period from 2017-2023 was up 100%, crime scene was up 270%, controlled substances was up 23%, DNA was up 42%, forensic pathology was up 139%, and post-mortem toxicology was up 38%. In addition, States recently surveyed by our organization provided data to support that firearms case submissions increased between 18% and 154% in the last few years. During the same timeframe, the turnaround times (time from intake into the lab to forensic report issued) increased 954% in blood alcohol, 25% in crime scene, 232% in controlled substances, 88% in DNA, and 246% in post-mortem toxicology. However, funding has not increased to address these issues.

The 119th Congress (2025-2027) has started, and there has been significant movement on budgets. Almost 20% of the Members of Congress are new and don't have the background or in some cases the significance of forensics within our justice system. To help, Congressman Guest (R-MS) and Congressman Cleaver (D-MO) have again created a "Congressional Forensic Science Caucus". Below is their description of the caucus and its mission:

The Congressional Forensic Science Caucus is an informal Congressional Member of Congress group dedicated to issues related for forensic science and education other Members on this subject. The purpose of this bipartisan caucus is to educate Members of Congress on matters critical to the criminal justice system that pertain to forensics science and to advocate for legislation that ensures the sciences' continuous advancement, wide availability to investigators and litigants, and compliance with the highest standards of quality assurance. Forensic science capabilities are changing rapidly, and Congress is often presented with legislation that addresses, for expel, the needs for further research, analyst training, and the implementation of new instrumentation and standards for its use. Our caucus serves as a forum to facilitate important information about these relevant topics and work to advance these significant issues."
